## The UCANZ Conference at St Francis Community Church, Hill Crest, Hamilton

Some thoughts from my day (Saturday) 19 October) attending the UCANZ Conference at St Francis Community Church, Hill Crest, Hamilton.

At 7.00am Joan Massey (driver extraordinaire) along with Vivien Naylor and Malvina Rees, collected me for our trip to Hamilton. It was good to get to know these ladies better and to enjoy the fellowship with the Peninsula arm of W.D.C.C.

The day began with opening devotions led by Ron Malpass, the outgoing executive officer for the Interchurch Council for Hospital Chaplaincy, who had been a Chaplain with the United Nations. If there is an opportunity to attend interchurch occasions, grab it. We are never too old or too young to learn and share and be enlivened and inspired.
